

### Veterans Sequential Intercept Model (V-SIM)

#### Overview

- The National Institute of Corrections worked collaboratively with SAMSHA, the VA, and members of the Justice Involved Veterans Network to adapt the sequential intercept model to the justiceinvolved veteran population.
- The V-SIM delineates interventions at distinct stages of the criminal justice system.
- Highlights interventions that may be more effective at a given stage considering the needs of the veteran.

### The Easiest Way to Explain Deflection

#### Not Waiting for Nor Needing...

- A Crisis
- An Overdose
- An Arrest

- Deflection is an early, upstream strategy
- Deflection is prevention
- Deflection is meeting people where they are in community





# Language Matters! How Deflection Differs from Diversion

#### **Deflection (Responders)**

- Centered in the community
- Moving away from justice system without having entered it
- <u>Behavioral health guided</u> with criminal justice partnerships
- Public health solution to better public safety – crime reduction and well being –"balanced approach"

#### **Criminal Justice Diversion**

- Centered in the justice system
- Moving out of justice system
   after having entered it
- <u>Criminal justice guided</u> with behavioral health partnerships
- A wide variety of approaches for a variety of reasons

# VETERANS DEFLECTION: SPECIAL IMPLICATIONS





### 1) Preserving Future Military Benefits

As a special application of deflection for veterans with military legal challenges subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), Veterans Deflection...


...Contemplates the use of civilian resources to supplement activeduty services to deflect and divert from military discharge categories that can limit their future eligibility for benefits





### **Preserving Future Military Benefits**

Generally, in order to receive VA benefits and services, the Veteran's character of discharge or service must be under other than dishonorable conditions (e.g., honorable, under honorable conditions, general). By law, discharge under less than honorable conditions (Bad Conduct and Dishonorable) constitute a legal bar to the payment of VA benefits.







### Potential Veterans Benefits Impacted

- VA medical and dental services
- VA home loans
- Burial in national cemeteries
- Educational benefits Montgomery or Post-9/11 GI Bill
- Stigma attached to having not received an Honorable Discharge
- Stigma can have negative consequences while searching for work or applying for school





### 2) Veterans Over Represent for MH and SUD

Deflect Early. Deflect Often. Using All three Prongs of Deflection

- 67% of Veterans who connected to VHA services were diagnosed with one or more mental health disorder. US General Pop (18%) Top two diagnoses: Depressive disorders (44%), PTSD (39%)
- 52% of Veterans who connected to VHA services were diagnosed with one or more <u>substance use disorders</u> US General Pop (5%) Top two diagnoses: Alcohol use disorder (39%) Cannabis use disorder 17%)

# Want to Reduce Drugs in Your Community? You Might Want to Deflect Instead of Arrest

While on patrol, police officers routinely encounter people who have substance use disorders (SUDs). In the United States, adults who were arrested in the past year for any serious offense were four times more likely to have used an illicit drug than those who were not arrested. Additional research shows that 87 percent of males tested positive for at least one illicit drug at the time of arrest and 40 percent tested positive for two or more. Following arrest, in part or directly related to their drug use, those arrested might land in jail or prison. While it is estimated that SUDs occur in 68 percent of the jail population and 53 percent of the jail population and 53 percent.

their next contact with police. We have also come to understand the harmful, unintended collateral consequences of repeated and extended contact with the justice system for those low-risk citizens who, due to their addiction, might be better treated in the community. To address this pervasive and costly situation, our citizens, our communities, and our police need solutions that call upon the resources of both the public safety and the public health systems, as well as reflect the desires and concerns of the local community; solutions that reduce crime, reduce drug use, save dollars, and seek to build a more just justice system

solution to this persistent challenge faced every day by police across the United States. The solution, known as the Montgomery County Deflection Model (the Model), is a pre-booking deflection (diversion) model focused on the SUD populations who have a high likelihood of repeated contact with police due to their untreated addictions and the attendant criminogenic effects (i.e., those effects statistically related to criminal activity).

The Montgomery County Model brings evidence-based practices currently used in other parts of the criminal justice system to policing at the front end of the justice con-





## REPORT OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY TO ASSESS First Responder Deflection Programs



Deflection is a strategy designed to save lives and keep individuals out of the justice system by providing <u>pathways</u> to treatment for those with substance use disorder (SUD) and other conditions. Its use has grown dramatically since fentanyl and other synthetic opioids became more accessible (see chart). The Center for Health and Justice (CHJ) at TASC and NORC partnered on a survey and report of more than 300 first responder agencies and their use of deflection.
