

- Collaboration: to help strengthen and/or create relationships between treatment providers in your area, allowing for more resources and treatment options for clients.
- Break down the negative stigma between law enforcement and the community. Allowing officers to see an individual's willingness to escape the thralls of addiction and acceptance of treatment. This also gives those struggling with SUD the compassion law enforcement has for the community they serve.
- How to give individuals motivation to get in and complete treatment. By deflecting these individuals from
  the judicial system and into a treatment center, we are getting them into facilities that can better manage
  their mental health and SUD than most jail facilities.

- Recognize the warning signs of suicide. The sooner warning signs are detected, and help sought, the better the outcome of a suicidal crisis will be.
- Know how to offer hope. Often, the simple offering of hope and social and spiritual support can avert a suicide attempt entirely.
- Know how to get help and save a life. QPR the general public is educated about the known warning signs of a suicide crisis: expressions of hopelessness, depression, giving away prized possessions, talking of suicide, securing lethal means, and then taught how to respond and where to refer.
